n this issue of *On the Journey* we celebrate jubilees. A jubilee is a time to look back with gratitude and to recall how God has been faithfully present. We gratefully acknowledge God's presence in our CPPS ministries and in the lives of our Sisters.

Over the coming months we will celebrate the jubilees of ten of our Sisters. One Sister will celebrate twenty-five years of profession, and three each will celebrate fifty, sixty and seventy years. These ten Sisters have devoted nearly 600 years of combined service to God's people. They have been teachers, homemakers, administrators, musicians and retreat directors.

In 1957, our community founded The English School in Tampere, Finland. In March 2017, we commemorated sixty years of service there to a diverse, international population of students. Shortly after that, the two Sisters who currently serve in Tampere will return to the States ending our CPPS presence there. Only God knows the full impact of these sixty years of service, but we trust that it has been far-reaching. We give thanks that God called our community to Tampere, and we pray that the seeds our Sisters sowed will continue to grow and flourish.

These are but a few of the reasons to celebrate. We also celebrate each of you! We are deeply grateful for your support of our community through your prayers, donations and volunteer service. May the coming summer months bring many opportunities to enjoy life and to be mindful of God's enduring love. Be assured of our prayers for you.



The English School in Tampere

he Sisters of the Most Precious Blood were only ministering in the United States until four Sisters, at the request of Finnish Bishop William Cobben, were asked to come to Finland in 1939 to be a Catholic presence, since less than 1% of the population was Catholic. The state religion of Finland is Lutheranism.

When the threat of war between Finland and the Soviet Union became evident, the Sisters who were working in Finland at the time had to decide whether to stay in the country or go back to America. All four Sisters had the exceptional courage of staying in Finland despite the war: "If you share the suffering of the people, you love them even more."

The English School in Helsinki opened in 1945 when the war operations had ceased in Finland. The English School in Tampere opened in 1957 when the Catholic Church established its own chapel in Tampere. The English School in Tampere recently marked its 60th Anniversary with a celebration on March 11, 2017.

The establishment of The English School in Tampere was connected to the spiritual activities of the Catholic Church. At the time there were roughly 50 Catholic Finnish people living in the Tampere area, and it was for their spiritual needs that a Chapel and a Catholic activity centre was being built. According to the tradition of the Sisters of the Most Precious Blood, who were in charge of The English School in Helsinki, it was natural to establish a school in connection with the chapel. The school started its activities as a kindergarten and preschool and is still open today.



Reflecting on my time in Tampere by Sr. Theresa Jezl



s we celebrated the 60th year of the little school our Sisters established in Tampere in 1957, I could feel only gratitude. This was never a Catholic school. The vast majority of the

children were Lutheran, so we emphasized the Christian aspect and were, at best, PR people for Catholicism. But the school has nothing to do with our parish, so we Sisters, in effect, lead double lives. As one of our priests told me, "You Sisters have it the hardest of all. You neither sow nor reap. But you clear the field of stones so that others can sow and reap."

There were challenges, but we Sisters were very enriched. We hoped we gave a good example to our pupils, but with no background in working under these conditions, we could only be ourselves, whatever that was. We were impelled to open ourselves to differences and to appreciate them. We learned that no church owns God and that we could learn about God from one another and that the process begins with mutual respect.

At the same time we learned to appreciate the members of our parish. Ours

is a church of foreigners. This is also true of the Finnish people who become Catholics. The unofficial definition of a Finn includes Lutheranism. A Finn, who becomes a Catholic, is no longer understood in the same way. They become foreigners in their own country. The other parishioners are immigrants or children of immigrants. We are black, brown, yellow and white and all combination in between, and we speak about 50 mother tongues—this in a parish of about 1,500 souls, scattered in an area of about 14,000 square miles.

We have grown with these challenges, fed by God and watered with the generosity and love of these people. They have helped us Sisters to live together, though we are isolated from our Precious Blood Community, our families, and from a more Catholic culture. We have been privileged to more clearly see the Church, as it is. I think often of the scripture passage: "We are now no longer strangers and foreigners, but members of the household of God..." In a homogenous parish, where all would be from the same kind of background, we might prefer to be "strangers and foreigners" to others. We might be more unable to respect differences.

The English School and Holy Cross Parish of Tampere have been channels of God's gifts to us. Thanks be to God!
