

Partners joined together for our annual Commitment Sunday. This year we were doubly blessed because it was also the anniversary of the founding of the Most Precious Blood Sisters in Steinerberg, Switzerland in 1845.

The day began with the introduction of leadership and governance. Sr. Janice gave us an update on the community with special emphasis on Partners in Mission and our continued relationship with the Sisters. There are sixty-three Sisters, with a median age of 83, and over one hundred Partners. Sr. Janice said, "Our relationship with you as Partners in Mission is very important to us, and we are committed to maintaining our relationship with you. We Sisters are here to support you and be here for you, but we want you to spread your wings and fly."

In addition to Sr. Janice's remarks, we also heard from Partner, Patti Belmont, who fittingly spoke of commitment. Her eloquent words reminded us of the importance of staying connected in action and spirit, and of our charism of reconciliation to one another and our world.

During our gathering, our Direction Statement was read, and each Small Faith Community (SFC) was given a candle and

Each was presented with her Partner in Mission pin by Sr. Janice. After our newest members made their commitment, all Partners then recommitted to another year. The Sisters touched us all with their song of blessing. It was a beautiful celebration.

Following Mass, we shared lunch in the Villa Theresa Dining Room. During our luncheon, each Sister was presented with a note card and rose from a Partner.

Collectively, Partners had decided beforehand to let our Sisters know that they will never be forgotten and each note reminded the recipient of that sentiment. In addition, three Partners, Chris Lloyd, Jeanne Palombo,

Sister Guillermina Loma Aliaga, CPPS -Maria Reina Parish



What is your current ministry or who are you working with?

My ministry at this moment is to serve at Maria Reina Parish, in La Paz, Bolivia. I minister with people in Social Programs such as: Promotion of Women, School Support, Golden Age (an elderly group), assistance to patients with cancer, and other needs as they arise.

What excites you or brings you joy about the work that you are doing?

I am moved by the way many people, despite their suffering and needs, have the strength to continue. I have to admit that I continually receive the gift, that of the blessing from the people who come to meet with me. It is of course not my merit. I have learned to look, to be open. That is my only task. I discovered that grace is not in projecting what one carries, but in discovering what comes to each person, and in everything there is "grace upon grace." I learn a lot from people. They live day by day putting their faith. hope, and trust in God. They experience the never-ending struggle to make ends meet. They are grateful for their family and delight when their family multiplies. They make the time to be together. Unfortunately, some despair and fall into other much more difficult realities. Yet I am happy to be with them. I have laughed with them: I have cried with them. For these experiences of mission and ministry, I thank God and my CPPS community.

Where do you think you have "planted seeds" in your ministry that will help to carry on CPPS' legacy?

I have shared my life with people aware that I am a Sister of the Most Precious Blood and I carry the hope that I have planted something in their memory of continued hope and God's unconditional love for them.

Cuál es tu ministerio actual o con quién estás trabajando?

Qué te emociona o te alegra del trabajo que estás haciendo?

(esa si es tarea propia) he descubierto que la gracia no está en proyectar lo que llevas, si no en descubrir lo que te viene, y ahí sí que todo es "gracia tras gracia", aprendo mucho de la gente, ellos viven el día a día poniendo su esperanza y fe en Dios. ellos saben lo difícil que será llegar a fin de mes, agradecen como familias multiplican su tiempo para estar juntos, otros se desesperan y caen en otras realidades mucho más difíciles, me alegrado con ellos también he llorado con ellos y por está experiencia en mi misión de doy gracias a Dios y a mi comunidad Cpps.

Entered CPPS: 1958 Professed vows: 1960

Sr. Marge taught elementary grades at Our Lady of Fatima, Florissant, MO; St. John's School, Uncasville, CT; and Redwood School of the Precious Blood in Redwood Falls, MN. She taught high school in Missouri at St. Henry in Charleston, St. John the Baptist and Bishop DuBourg in St. Louis, and St. Mary's Academy in O'Fallon. At Bishop DuBourg she also served as assistant principal. Sr. Marge was a member of the congregational leadership team, administrator and local coordinator of our retirement center, and served almost ten years in ministry to the poor through St. Agatha Center in St. Louis.

Marge brought a deep spirit of love and care to each of her ministries, to her students, to our sisters, and to her clients at St. Agatha. Respect for the individual was a hallmark, along with smiles, encouragement, and warm hugs. She developed strong and supportive friendships with her fellow teachers and felt that they, too, were part of her ministry.




Sr. Mary David Debrecht, CPPS





"Did You Know?"

Did you know that there used to be a pond on the Sisters' property? It was drained in 1923 and made into a sunken garden. Later the sunken garden was made into the small walking park to the left of the driveway as you enter the property.
