

#### **Dear Friends,**

During the first two weeks of April, I was privileged to visit our sisters in Bolivia and Peru. It was a joy to be with them and to witness the impact of their ministries.

In the places visited, it was not unusual to see homes of those with financial means next to homes of the desperately poor. It seemed a sharp contrast to neighborhoods in the United States which tend to be clearly poor, middle class, or wealthy. Such segregation can make it easy to overlook the poor. However, when one's home abuts that of a family with hungry children, it is not so easy to forget.



In our Fall 2023 magazine, you read of the ministry of Sister María Luz Mejía in Lima, Peru. In this issue, we feature Sister María Jesús Montaño and her ministry in Cochabamba, Bolivia. In Fall 2024, we will tell of Sister Guillermina (Guichy) Loma and her ministry in La Paz, Bolivia. A few words and pictures cannot adequately express the impact of their ministries, but I hope you will get a taste of who they are and what they do.

#### Partners In Mission



One of the most commonly asked questions about Partners in Mission from outside the community is, "What do Partners do?"

Every Partner belongs to a Small Faith Community that meets every month from September to May. These communities are a place where Partners share and grow in their faith. The members of these groups form a strong bond and often speak of their connection and sense of belonging. But this is only part of being a Partner in Mission.

There are several opportunities throughout the year to interact with the larger Partners in Mission community through events including the Partners' Picnic in July, Commitment Sunday in September, and Winter Assembly in February.

Group service projects were added in the Fall of 2023 and Partners gathered donations for St. Francis Community Services which aids refugee families and helped sort food at the Sts. Joachim and Ann Care Center.

For the first time, an Advent Retreat was offered in November. There are plans to make this an annual event as well as adding a Lenten Retreat for 2025.

Another new activity planned for this summer is Partners on Pilgrimage. Several times a year, a pilgrimage to an area religious site, church or shrine will be offered. This is an opportunity for Partners to interact with those from other Small Faith Communities and to bring a friend who may be interested in joining Partners. The first pilgrimage is scheduled for June 22. We will be touring the Shrine of St. Philippine Duchesne in St. Charles.

### What is your current ministry?

I work with a group called Volunteer Pink Ladies who give their time to serve persons who need support in different areas: Pediatrics Child burn victims Maternity Children with cancer Volunteer Pharmacy

I work with the Volunteers in the Pharmacy. We receive donated medicines from hospitals, doctors, or private clinics. We give medicines at no charge to needy persons who are looking for help in getting the required medicines. I volunteer four mornings a week.

## What excites you or brings you joy about the work that you do?

I am happy to have the opportunity to serve my brothers and sisters who can't pay for their medication, so they can receive them and be healed from their maladies.

#### Where do you think you have "planted seeds" in your ministry that will help to carry on your CPPS legacy?

I hope that my ministry leaves a memory for people that not all is bad in life and that God does not abandon them. He works through other people.

**S**r. María Jesús is a registered nurse who provided direct patient care in hospitals and clinics for many years. Though she is no longer involved in nursing, she is very active as a volunteer in the health care ministry.

When visiting Sr. María Jesús at her place of ministry, it becomes obvious that she is greatly appreciated by the organizations with whom she serves. The faces of the doctors, nurses, and her volunteer companions light up when she enters the room. She goes about her work quietly and without fanfare, but it is obvious that her service makes a huge difference.

In addition to her volunteer service at the hospital pharmacy, Sr. María Jesús is a liaison

to many of the other ministries where our sisters formerly served. North American friends of these ministries, including some of you who are reading this article, give generously to support these organizations so that they can continue to carry on the work once done by our sisters. Sr. María Jesús makes sure that donations received through our community and through the Pan y Amor (Bread and Love) organization of the Archdiocese of St. Louis reach their intended recipients. The donations that are designated for her own work, she uses to assist families who cannot afford the medications or infant formula that they need for their children.

Her life is a testament that one person can have a far-reaching impact.

**Sr. Luanna Brucks**January 2, 1925 - October 11, 2023
Entered CPPS: July 25, 1943
Professed vows: August 10, 1945

Sr. Luanna taught at every level, from kindergarten through college, in Missouri, Illinois, and Nebraska. She also served as a parish liturgist, musician, and pastoral minister in Moberly and Marshall, MO.

Sr. Luanna's words of advice for a happy life: "Get up each morning knowing that God loves you and take it from there." For the cover of her funeral liturgy, Sr. Luanna requested the words from a song by Gregory Norbet, "Long have I waited for your coming home to me and living deeply our new life."



**Sr. Katherine Ann Wildt**April 14, 1937 - January 28, 2024
Entered CPPS: July 25, 1955
Professed vows: August 10, 1957

Sr. Katherine Ann taught elementary grades in Missouri, Nebraska, and Illinois. She served in secondary education in St. Louis and O'Fallon. At the college level, she was an instructor and professor at St. Louis University, St. Mary's College in O'Fallon, and Missouri Valley College in Marshall, Missouri.

A lifelong learner and a great lover of art and literature, Sr. Katherine Ann inspired in her students these same appreciations.



**Sr. Lorraine Brueggemann** *February 19, 1932 - February 22, 2024*Entered CPPS: July 25, 1950
Professed vows: August 10, 1952

Sr. Lorraine taught elementary grades in Missouri and served as both principal and teacher in Biehle. In 1972, she was missioned to St. Elizabeth Academy (SEA) where she would serve for forty-two years. She taught theology and later served as Admissions Director and Financial Aid Director.

In her autobiography, Sr. Lorraine wrote, "My goal was always to lead students to a greater love and stronger relationship with Jesus Christ. I always tried to picture myself as transparent so students could see Jesus through me."


### CONGRATULATIONS


