

Dear Friends,

On Easter Monday, our CPPS community joined the world in mourning the passing of Pope Francis. While we rejoice with him in his new life with God, we feel keenly the loss of his simple, gentle, and merciful presence.

Many beautiful and well-deserved tributes have been written, and Pope Francis' life of unwavering service was fittingly honored at his funeral on April 26. While I have nothing unique to add, I recall the words he said so often, "Tedos, todos, todos!" All, all, all are welcome!



On May 8, Cardinal Robert Prevost became Pope Leo XIV. In his first blessing, we heard repeatedly the Italian word, tutti (all). He wished peace to all peoples and to all the earth; he reminded us that "God loves you all and we are all in God's hands."

While this is a time of transition for our Church, it is also a time of profound continuity, a continuity rooted in the message of God's all-inclusive love.

Sister Barbara Jean Franklin, ASC, who has been ministering with us for the past three years, will become our leader effective July 1, 2025.

Just as the new leader of our Church does not change the essence of our Church, this change in leadership does not change the essence of our community. Sister Barbara Jean, along with our dedicated and competent lay staff, will continue to provide for the well-being of our sisters. Our sisters will continue to be present here in O'Fallon and in other missions where we serve. We will continue our mission to be a sign of Christ's loving, redeeming presence in our world.

We are deeply grateful for each of you who are companions with us on our journey - todos, todos - tutti, tutti, tutti! We look forward to continuing the journey with you. In the words of Pope Leo XIV, "Without fear united hand in hand with God and each other - let us go forward. We are disciples of Christ. Christ goes before us."

Teaching ceramics was one of my favorite ministries. Usually, the students had no prior experience with clay, so the class was a new, creative and usually relaxing experience for them.



Supporting these children's education, taking them to the doctor when a child was sick, listening to their sad stories, and accompanying them in their healing process has been a privilege for me to be a messenger of Reconciliation with these little ones.

St. Agatha



St. Agatha Parish, St. Louis 1873.

In 1872, the Sisters of the Most Precious Blood were welcomed into the newly formed parish of St. Agatha by the pastor Rev. Herman Leygraaf and his parishioners. In September of that year, the Sisters began teaching in the parish school and continued to do so for 100 years until the closing of the school in 1972. The construction of highways had removed homes and families from within the boundaries of the parish and contributed greatly to the school's closing.

The Sisters, however, wished to remain present in the parish in some way, since it was their first home in the Archdiocese of St. Louis. Four Sisters came to live in the convent which was now mainly used to serve as a house of prayer. They were also asked to conduct a census of the parish to learn who was still living within its boundaries and what were the present needs of the people.

Not long after, homeless people in the area began ringing the doorbell asking for something to

eat. Preparing soup and sandwiches became part of the activity of the house of prayer. Gradually feeding the homeless evolved into St. Agatha Food Pantry and Center where persons within the parish boundaries could come to receive assistance for food, utilities, gas vouchers, bus tickets, etc. They could also find a listening ear in persons who prayed with and for them.

As of May 19, 2025, the Sisters of the Most Precious Blood will no longer be living and working at St. Agatha Convent and Parish. As the final Sisters leave, they are conscious of the many blessings they personally have received, as well as all our Sisters who have served here.

The Sisters of the Most Precious Blood want to thank all of the parishioners, both from the Polish speaking community as well as the English speaking community for all of the ways they have supported them both materially and spiritually and will treasure the friendships they have made over the years.

"At the heart of any healthy spirituality is gratitude. When I think back to my experiences working with the Sisters in parish ministry, "thank you" seems hardly adequate and entirely appropriate. Giving, without counting the cost, is probably the most courageous example of faith I know. Thank you Reverand Sisters. Thank you and may God reward your every prayer, every work, and act of mercy."

We Remember... We Celebrate... We Believe...



Sr. Mary George HellmannAugust 16, 1927 November 17, 2024

Entered: 1945 Professed Vows: 1947

After serving in the art department for several years, Sr. Mary George was asked to assist at the archbishop's

residence in St. Louis. In addition to the archbishop's residence, she served in Missouri at the motherhouse and infirmary kitchens in O'Fallon; St. Elizabeth Academy, St Louis; St. Vincent, Dutzow; St. John the Baptist, Gildehaus; and St. Sabina, Florissant. She also served at St. Mary's in Quincy, IL, and at St. Catherine's in Redwood Falls, MN.

Sr. Mary George was innocent, unpretentious, precise and deliberate in all that she did. Though quiet, and seemingly timid, she was never at a loss for words; a visit with her was seldom short. She was always eager to know about others, and she was faithful in sending cards and letters.



Sr. LaVerne Wester April 30, 1931 -January 23, 2025

Entered: 1949 Professed Vows: 1951

For thirty-nine years, Sr. LaVerne (John Leonard) was a dedicated teacher and principal at Holy Innocents, Holy Family, St. Stephen in St. Louis and at St. Joseph in Omaha.

She went on to serve as principal at Sacred Heart in Florissant, the largest Catholic school in the Archdiocese of St. Louis at that time, and then at Assumption in O'Fallon. Retirement from education marked the beginning of another thirty years of ministry to elders, the sick, and the poor ministering at St. Elizabeth Adult Day Care Center, the motherhouse, Mercy Hospital, and Sts. Joachim and Ann Care Service.

Sr. LaVerne's life was all about relationships – relationships with community, family, friends, students and their parents, faculty, and coworkers. She loved being with friends whether it was while playing cards, watching a Cardinals' baseball game or having lunch. Her friends were delighted with her handwritten notes or phone calls for "special occasions" and for "no reason."



Sr. Mary HarperJuly 26, 1938 February 4, 2025

Entered: 1957 Professed Vows: 1959

Sr. Mary was a much-loved teacher at Most Sacred Heart, Florissant; teacher/ principal at St. Stephen Protomartyr, St. Louis; and

Assumption, O'Fallon. She served as principal at St. Paul in Fenton, St. George; St. Monica in St. Louis; and at St. Sabina in Florissant. After retiring from education, Sr. Mary continued to share her talents in varied ways. She served as a driver and local coordinator for the retirement community at the motherhouse. She ministered as manager of St. Elizabeth Adult Day Care Center, Maplewood; coordinator of the Sisters of Mercy retirement home and served the poor and needy at Sts. Joachim and Ann Care Service.

Sr. Mary continued to appreciate those whom she served, as evidenced by her saving letters they wrote to her. These letters from former students, teachers, pastors, and others affirm the excellence, respect, and loving care with which she ministered.



Sister Mary Vénard LeBeau February 22, 1923 -March 10, 2025

Entered: 1942 Professed Vows: 1944

Sr. Mary Vénard taught for five years at St. George School in St. Louis before being missioned to Finland. Sr. Mary

Vénard taught preschool and elementary grades at The English Schools in Helsinki and Tampere, serving as the principal in Helsinki. She served twenty years in Estonia teaching in Tallin and in Tartu. Later she worked in development for the schools in Tallin and Tartu, and for organizations caring for the handicapped, the blind, the sick and the elderly. She returned to Finland in 2015 and began ministering to African refugees.

Small of stature but mighty in deeds, Sr. Mary Vénard was recognized for her dedication by the Rotary Club of Denver, the Ebenezer Foundation of Finland, the President of Estonia with the Pro Terra Mariana Medal of Honor, and Pope Benedict XVI with the Pont. Maximus Award, the Church's highest lay honor. We are confident that her spirit lives on in the thousands of children and adults whose gifts she nurtured.

Every Partner belongs to one of several Small Faith Communities. These small groups, each with their own individual personality, are the core and the strength of Partners in Mission. The road to becoming a Partner in Mission begins with a conversation. Candidates then attend five "Pathways" classes. During this period of exploration, candidates become part of a Small Faith Community, learn about Partners in Mission and the Sisters' history, charism, and former ministries. They also discover something about themselves and where they are on their personal faith journey. After completing Pathways, candidates discern whether to make a one-year commitment to become a Partner.
